Global System Dynamics and Policies is a project funded by the Future & Emerging Technologies division of the European Commission. The project began in May 2008, and will continue until April 2010.

The project's purpose is to review how complex systems analysis can be applied to policy decisions, with a particular focus on climate change, sustainable cities, risk, energy and social problems.

The programme aims to connect the building of different methodologies of multi-physics modelling, engineering systems, dynamics, economics and organisations modelling. We hope that this process of connection will lead to some integration of these approaches.
